

### A Letter from the Principal

We had another fantastic "Catch The Wave" event at PVGC on February 27. The weather could not dampen the enthusiasm as our Booster Club sponsored event brought together about 300 parents with over 30 PVHS faculty and staff members. We had students volunteering their time to help in a variety of ways. We made a lot of money for the Booster Club and everyone had a great time. Parent support has been one of the keys to our success over the last eight years. I would like to highlight these contributions.

Our PTSA has 24 Executive Board members under the leadership of President Kristin Curren. They meet once monthly and then there is a general meeting which is usually on the last Tuesday of each month at 9:15 in the MPR. Parents also take on major projects such as the reflections program, disaster drills, registration and hospitality for numerous events each year. Every year we get new members and the quality of support never changes – it is outstanding!

The Booster Club is led by Tom O'Hern and there are 30 members of the Executive Board. The Executive Board hosts a general meeting which is usually on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of each month at 7:00 in the library. This meeting is preceded by a meeting of the Athletic Committee and every level of every sport has a parent who serves as a "team representative. The Academic and Arts Committees meet at different times before the general meeting and parents join staff members to discuss important issues. The Booster Club consistently raises over \$400,000 annually to supplement district funding. Our Booster Club is outstanding.

Along the way parents help in other ways throughout the year. In athletics parents help the coaches with programs, team dinners and banquets. We have PV dads doing the chains on the sidelines at football games and dads regularly help as announcers at various sporting events. Parents help in a number of ways at track and cross country competitions. If you check out a drama, music, choreo or competition dance program you will find parents helping in every way imaginable. PVIT was preceded by DARPA and both of these "techy groups" have regularly met on Sunday afternoons. Parents for 7 years have lent their technical expertise and have even come in to be guest lecturers. Mock Trial and every other extra curricular group have tremendous parent support.

The end result is that we have a good thing going at PVHS. Our teachers, coaches and staff appreciate the help and our students are the beneficiaries. The only bad news is that when seniors graduate, we also lose great parents. There are exceptions to this rule and Ann Zimmerman stands out. Ann, you are the best! We can always use "new blood." ### 80s MUSICAL 'FOOTLOOSE' WILL ROCK PV HIGH

The Palos Verdes High School Drama Department will present the stage musical phenomenon, Footloose, April 16-24. In 1984, the movie version of Footloose starring Kevin Bacon captured the heart of America and made it beat to the music of a solid-gold soundtrack with such rock classics as Let's Hear it For the Boy, Holding Out for a Hero, Almost Paradise, and the title song Footloose. The high-energy stage musical became a Broadway smash hit and had audiences on their feet with its dazzling dance scenes, electrifying music, and dramatic story of teenage rebellion.

The show begins when Ren, a big city kid, is forced to move to small town Bomont, where he discovers that dancing and rock and roll are illegal in the conservative community. It doesn't take him long to shake up the status quo, and soon the high school students are sending the town into a frenzy while trying to overturn the law against dancing.

"Footloose is a tremendously fun musical, full of youthful spirit, awesome choreography, and an incredible score," says drama teacher Nicole Thompson, who directs the production. ### University of Kansas Counselor Fly-In February 18-21, 2010

Why Kansas? The question on everyone's mind when I announced I had accepted an invitation to visit the University of Kansas. I was quick to add my trip was being paid by the University and a nice way to see Kansas, since it was not on any of my future itineraries. I admit it, I was wondering "why Kansas" myself and found myself completely impressed with the school environment, academic curriculum and die-hard Jayhawk spirit of the students.

The University of Kansas Admissions Office recognized the increase in applications to "KU" from PVHS. The information session in the CCC held last fall with the KU Admissions Officer in charge of southern California, Jessica Walters, was packed with students. PVHS Social Studies teacher Jama Crady-Maxfield, a KU alum, may be a source of the KU spirit on campus with her spirited KU display in her classroom and proud announcement of having seven PVHS students currently attending KU.

The secret is out. The University of Kansas is a real gem. KU is a Big 12 Conference school located in Lawrence, voted one of the best college towns in the U.S, a student-friendly village filled with stores ranging from the local barber shop owned by the Mayor to mega-chain stores Urban Outfitters and the Gap. KU is also one of the best college bargains in the U.S. Truth be told, a California student can attend the University of Kansas for about the same price as attending a UC campus, including housing and out of state tuition fees. KU also offers Scholarship Houses where all residents share the duties from cleaning to cooking in exchange for reduced housing fees.

The School of Journalism and Mass Communications is one of the top-rated programs in the U.S. Other academic units at KU include: Architecture, Design & Planning, Business, Liberal Arts & Sciences, Arts, Education, Engineering, Pharmacy and Social Welfare. The Admission Office arranged for former PVHS student Gavin Fodemski ('08) to join us for lunch. I asked Gavin to send me a message to PVHS students why they should consider KU:

"At first I was a little timid about going to a school out of state, then when I got to KU everyone was really nice and welcoming. It is such a great experience living here at KU because you get to meet so many different people and even though there are thousands of students, it's still such a small world. Not to mention the experience of the best basketball tradition in the nation! This is where BASKETBALL was invented! Another really great part about KU is the endless portals of lifestyles, that all intertwine in a very exciting way. This is definitely an incredible experience and if I had to do the whole process over again, I wouldn't change a thing. "

School spirit flourishes at KU. Proving their point, our group was treated to a KU Basketball game in the field house with over 16,000 KU students and fans. Having a top-rated NCAA Basketball team doesn't hurt, but the royal blue colors and "rock chalk Jayhawk...KU!" echoed a loud but haunting chant throughout the arena. (I even took the Sea King to the game!)





### Tid Bits from Collegewise

People talk a lot about how hard college admissions is on kids these days. But it's no picnic for parents, either. You want to be supportive and do whatever you can to make sure your kids are happy with their college choices. But these good intentions can sometimes lead parents to unwittingly hurt their kids' chances of admission. So this month, our Collegewise counselors are sharing five common college admissions mistakes parents must avoid.

#### 1. Don't get involved with the college essays.

When a parent helps too much with a college essay, it is almost always glaringly apparent to an admissions officer. Parents think and write differently than kids do. And colleges want to hear your kids' thoughts and perspectives, not yours. In fact, our experience has been that parental involvement in college essays almost never leads to better essays (or better family relations). So let your student take the lead and write what she wants to write. And while you stay hands-off, encourage your kids to seek feedback from an English teacher or counselor who knows them well.

### 2. Don't contact colleges on your student's behalf.

When a parent repeatedly calls or emails an admissions office to ask questions, it's natural for admissions officers to wonder why the student isn't mature enough to call on his own. That's why we recommend that any communication with an admissions office come from the student, not the parent. This is the time for these young adults to begin developing the ability to show initiative and take care of themselves. The one exception to this rule is when it's time to discuss financial aid, as the admissions offices don't expect kids to carry on discussions about family finances.

#### 3. Don't secure activities for your student.

It's easy for colleges to spot the applicant who volunteered at the hospital after his mother made all the calls, filled out the paperwork, and physically wrestled him into the car to get him there. That mother has shown a great deal of initiative (and a surprising amount of strength). But the student hasn't really shown much of anything. It's perfectly OK to help guide your student and offer advice, but let her decide what she'd like to do and how she's going to start.

### 4. Don't always listen to what your friends say about admissions.

We're consistently surprised by the amount of inaccurate college information that parents get from other parents at dinner parties. The truth is that while many people claim to know a lot about colleges admissions, very few actually do. So unless the person giving you advice is a counselor or an admissions officer, check with your high school counselor before following any free advice from your friends.

#### 5. Don't lose perspective.

Don't forget that your son or daughter's future success and happiness are not dependent on the admission to one particular college. We're not psychologists, but we've watched over 2500 families go through the college admissions process, and we've noticed that the parents who seem to enjoy the best relationship with their kids during this stressful time are those who make it clear they will proudly wear the sweatshirt of any college their kid chooses to attend. Kids today are feeling an enormous amount of pressure about college admissions. They need you to be the voice of reason who knows that good kids who work hard and have supportive parents will always turn out just fine.

So be a supportive partner, but let your kids take the lead. That will give you back some time to, say, plan a picnic?


### Teen Fun on the Peninsula Center Library Rooftop

- Everything is searchable, and anonymity is a myth. If people aren't cautious, digital footprints can be damaging to their future reputations.
- While kids and adults may be equally guilty of making poor choices about how they leave a digital footprint, only kids have an excuse – the part of their brain that understands long-term consequences isn't fully formed until they're in their 20s.
- What's important for kids and parents to understand is that this really is a profoundly new playground. The kids haven't changed:
- They're still exploring who they are
- They're still being mean to each other
- They're still searching for connections and validation
- They're still experimenting with risky behavior.
- What has changed is the fact that there could very well be a permanent record of all of this exploration, one with implications that kids can't predict or control.
- This doesn't mean that we should be fearful of new media or limit its use entirely. There are a lot of great things to be gained from interacting with media. Let's look at some of those opportunities now.


